


Kindergarten Art

The kindergarten students practiced their design and cutting skills by creating 3D paper sculptures in the form of "peace doves." The doves were carefully crafted from white cardstock, and the students used markers to add vibrant colors, giving each one a unique design. They attached a loop of string to the top, making it look as though the birds were flying when suspended.





Lower Elementary Art

The Lower Elementary students had the opportunity to create customized bookmarks on authentic Egyptian papyrus. As part of the project, they learned that the names of pharaohs were often written in hieroglyphics and enclosed in an oval shape called a cartouche. The students used pencils, permanent pens, and colored pencils to design their cartouches, writing their own names or the names of loved ones in hieroglyphics.

The Upper Elementary students worked with wire and glass beads to create beautiful sun catchers in the shapes of leaves or trees. They carefully threaded the beads with their fingers and wrapped the wire. When held up to a window, the light passed through the beads, making them glow, and the students were pleased to see their creations illuminated in vibrant colors.

For example, one student remarked, "El cocodrilo es largo, fuerte y feroz," which translates to "The crocodile is long, strong, and ferocious." As always, the children delighted in singing both new and familiar songs.

They enhanced their ability to identify various animals, read about their characteristics, write detailed descriptions, and understand their behaviors. As the Christmas season approached, students also expanded their vocabulary related to the holiday. They concluded the year with a creative craft project, during which they described their creations.

Upper Elementary Music


